Roc Day Potluck Luncheon

Note the January meeting will be held at the home of Judy Larter. We gather at 10:00am and start the business meeting at 10:30am. Park on the grass along the driveway or if snowy Judy will have a plowed area.

Directions to Judy's home from Manlius or Fayetteville:

From Rt 173 take a right onto S Eagle Village Rd for a mile, then a left on Peck Hill Rd for 1.5 miles. W Lake Rd will be on your right, go about a mile and Judy's long dirt driveway is on the left with a granite post and weathervane.

From Cazenovia:

Head north on Forman St / E Lake Rd for 3.7 miles. Turn left onto N Lake Rd, after .8 miles, turn right onto W Lake Rd. After .7 miles you will reach Judy's long dirt driveway with a granite post and weathervane.

For those unfamiliar with Roc Day, according to Wikipedia
https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Distaff_Day:

Distaff Day, also called **Roc Day** or **Rock Day**, is 7 January, the day after the feast of the [Epiphany](#). It is also known as **Saint Distaff's Day**, one of the many unofficial holidays in Catholic nations.

The [distaff](#), or roc, used in spinning was the medieval symbol of women's work. In many European cultural traditions, women resumed their household work after the [twelve days of Christmas](#). Women of all classes would spend their evenings spinning on the wheel. During the day, they would carry a [drop spindle](#) with them. Spinning was the only means of turning raw wool, cotton or flax into thread, which could then be woven into cloth.

MEMBER BIO: Jayshri Prasad

Hi, my name is Jayshri Prasad. My journey of spinning threads, goes long back. When I was 4 or 5 years old, my father was posted in a very small town called Rajmahal, in India. HE was a doctor in government hospital and was posted to different town every three years. I started my school in that place. Every Saturday mornings, we were made to spin threads with cotton on a device called thakli. It was more like drop spindle but made out of metal and didn't drop to the ground. We moved from that place in a year and I forgot all about spinning till I came to Syracuse in 1982. I was in my early 30s then when I met Joan Peters and saw her spinning wool on spinning wheel. I was fascinated and wanted to try it. She generously gave me one of her wheel and a bag of wool to practice. I spun enough wool to knit a sweater. I already knew how to knit, crochet and embroidery thanks to my very talented grandmother. I enjoyed spinning so much that I ended up purchasing my own wheel. At that point of my life, I became very busy with work and raising children . Spinning , knitting was left behind for several years . I picked it again when my children left home. I also picked up weaving by accident . There's a long story behind it. To make it short, I was waiting at Mt.Sinai hospital while my husband was getting his blood test done , I met a woman who was impressed with my knitting and the color of my wool . I told her that spun this wool and dyed it myself . She asked if I ever wove. I said no but I wouldn't mind trying it someday . She said she is an art professor and she has a simple loom at her studio. She would like to give it to me.she took my address and mailed it next month. I taught myself how to thread it from the help of YouTube and made several shawls. First one for the kind professor . After that I took weaving lessons from a very talented weaver Clara Rose and purchased a big floor loom. This is my journey with fiber art.
