### **MEMBER BIO: Julie Knighton**

I was first introduced to crochet by a neighbor at our camp in the Adirondacks. I called her Aunt Peg, and I was very young, probably around eight years old. She did this as a way to keep me occupied as I used to wander over and bugged her constantly. I made a granny square blanket from all kinds of her scrap yarn and I still have this blanket displayed in my living room. I would make things through my high school years, mostly afghans. I didn't pick up crochet again until I had children and then I mostly made little scarves for my daughter.

I learned to knit from my aunt who was a master knitter and lived upstairs in my childhood two family home. I had always heard the story from my father of how she learned to knit when he was in World War II. She made him a sweater and one sleeve was very short, and the other was extremely long, but he always said he wore that sweater with so much pride. He also joked that if she had continued to make her projects instead of constantly pulling out whatever she was knitting, there would be dozens more sweaters and such in the house. She relentlessly bugged me about learning to knit so I gave up and attempted to learn when I was in my 40s. Lo and behold I loved it! She taught me how to read patterns and eventually I made my first sweater a few years ago having caught the bug. She would tease me that everything I made was "too easy" And I just smiled.

I decided one of my bucket list items would be to raise an animal, harvest the fiber, spin the wool and knit an article of clothing. I found it difficult to find anyone near me who had the skill and was willing to teach me. Last June I turned on the news and there was the Cherry Valley spinning group advertising their booth at the Buckville Fiber Festival. I jumped in my car the next morning and the rest is history.

I purchased my spinning wheel last October and although I haven't been able to spend much time with Wee Peg, I know in my heart this is the group of wonderful, kind, caring women that will help me reach, if not all my bucket list items (no idea how I'm going to raise an animal yet), at least I'll spin the yarn that will be turned into something beautiful I can wear. But Wee Peg will have to wait a bit longer since I learned this week I'm going to be a Babcia (grandma) for the first time and I'll be very busy making all kinds of little treasures for our new family member! It was a true blessing I turned on the news that morning.
