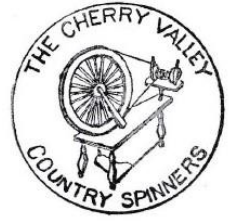

Sprinkle Dyeing Workshop

Note the change of location to Springside Farm in Fabius.

For the Sprinkle Dyeing Workshop there are a few things you should bring, but many others will be provided or shared. Remember to wear old clothes or an apron - Kool-Aid dyes are pretty permanent. We'll be sprinkling Kool-Aid directly on wetted yarn or yarn in a low immersion water bath.

Please bring:

- Yarn - 100% animal fiber. Wool is recommended, but you could try this with alpaca, mohair or other. No acrylic! Tie a skein **loosely** with multiple strings in a color you can identify as your skein. Remember that the liquid and dye should be able to reach all the yarn. If you buy a ball of yarn, you can make a skein over the back of a chair if you don't have a swift or niddy noddy. Yarn can be white or a pale shade if you want to experiment. Multiple small skeins would be fun.
- Wooden or other non-metal stirrers/spoons or tongs
- Gloves - yellow kitchen or other waterproof gloves
- Plastic basin or Tupperware for rinsing and transporting wet yarn. Zip Loc bags would be good for taking yarn home.
- Cards or a notebook for recording details of your results.

Things you may bring - but most will be provided:

- Crockpot
- Pans like turkey roasters or other enamel - if you have your own it will be possible to keep the fiber in there until it absorbs all the dye and cools.
- Plastic wrap for a non-immersion technique
- White vinegar
- Kool-Aid (generic is fine) in colors you prefer - we have lots!
- McCormick food coloring or Wilton food paste color (droppers will be provided)
- Hot plate

We'll start pre-soaking the yarn at 10:00am as soon as people arrive. The business meeting will start at 10:30am and once completed we'll start sprinkle dyeing yarn. Show and Tell can be held while we are awaiting the results of our dyeing efforts. If you are so inclined, bring a treat to share and your coffee mug.

MEMBER BIO: Chris Rudecoff

Member since January 2024

Favorite type of fiber art: Hard to pick a favorite fiber art. I'm probably best at crochet and sewing, but I'll take on knitting projects and am currently learning how to do Andean pebble weaving using a small rigid heddle loom. I'm enjoying having the time to explore new fiber arts now that I'm retired.

Favorite materials: My preferred materials really depend on the project - I'm currently crocheting with very fine linen to make a market bag and am learning to weave with cotton. Alpaca is up there when I want to knit or crochet a warm garment.

Favorite piece of equipment: For equipment, I recently learned about using circular knitting needles for all types of projects - a great revelation to me. For weaving, I'm not fully satisfied with the small rigid heddle loom I'm using and am planning to research other options. I've also made some attempts to learn how to use a drop spindle to spin wool. I haven't been persistent at practicing, so I haven't really gotten the hang of it yet. I'm hoping that, at some point in time, I might get some help from one of the Cherry Valley fiber artist members.

The first fiber art I remember doing was: My first fiber art was definitely sewing. I had one of those mini/toy singer sewing machines when I was a child. By the time I got to high school, I was making a lot of my own clothes. For needlework, I think it was crocheting that I taught myself first, knitting came later.

I learned to spin/knit/crochet/felt/weave/etc from: I learned to sew from a family friend and a childhood friend's mother; both women had dressmaking businesses. I taught myself to crochet and knit from books and pamphlets my mother had. There was a time in my life when I was living in towns in central Mexico or Peru while I was doing

archaeological field work. There wasn't a lot to do in the evenings, so I often took up knitting or crochet projects where I honed my skills.

The last item I completed was: I've been trying to use up yarn I've been carrying around for years. I had some bulky weight linen leftover from macrame projects way back when I was in college (made placemats for my mother). I recently completed a crocheted bag using a front- and back- post crochet pattern designed by Danish fiber artist Sidel Sanglid. I really like the botanical/organic patterns she creates. I had to make a few adjustments to the pattern to make it work for linen yarn, but I'm pleased with how the bag turned out. I've started working on another Sidsel Sanglid bag using fine linen yarn - also left over from my macrame era.

My inspiration comes from: I love textiles and beautiful fabric and am especially attracted to the ancient to current textiles made by the indigenous peoples of the Americas from Navajo rugs to Guatemalan and Andean textiles. Back in the 1980s, when I worked at the Wheelwright Museum in Santa Fe, New Mexico, I curated an exhibit of a private collection of highland Mayan weavings. I felt so lucky to have had the opportunity to work with textiles from so many Mayan traditions.

In addition to fiber arts, some of my favorite things are: I enjoy being outside whether it's hiking, kayaking or gardening. I'm currently trying to establish a native plant garden to support pollinators.

I would like to add: I look forward to becoming a part of the Cherry Valley fiber artists' community, learning from the members' great depth and breadth of knowledge, and to making new friends.
